MINUTES OF MEETING

TOWN OF WIGGINS BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

January 22, 2025 at 7:00 P.M.

CALL TO ORDER & ROLL CALL

A meeting of the Town Board of Trustees for the Town of Wiggins, Colorado was held on Wednesday, January 22, 2025. Mayor Chris Franzen called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. The following answered roll call: Mayor Pro-Tem Steven Perrott, and Trustees: Bruce Miller, Berry Tomlinson, Steven Klecka, Michael Seiber, and Robert McKeighan. Staff present were Craig Miller, Town Manager; Nichole Seiber, Town Clerk/Treasurer, Diana Evans, Planning & Zoning Administrator; Beau Warden, Public Works Supervisor and Police Chief Jim Parks.

APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

A motion was made by Trustee Miller to approve the agenda. The motion was seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Perrott. Roll Call: The agenda was unanimously approved.

CONSENT AGENDA

A motion was made by Trustee Klecka to approve the Consent Agenda. Motion was seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Perrott. Roll Call: The Consent Agenda was unanimously approved.

TOWN STAFF REPORTS

Town Manager:

- -Due to last minute legal requirements the Town Comprehensive Plan will be heard February 11th at the Planning & Zoning Commissioner meeting then on February 26th it will be presented to the BOT meeting.
- Town Manager attended the Morgan County Economic Development meeting this month. Hopeful development projections were addressed.
- -USDA process for security inspection should be done every 3 years. The last one completed was in 2019. Reviews should be done every 6yrs, that one is overdue also. Water system grants require compliance, which we are working toward now.
- -Updating Town Hall with paint, wi-fi system, working towards catching up to the 21st century.

-Public Works:

- -Non-pot line/9400ft pipe in ground, currently waiting on Archdiocese real estate office counteroffer to complete process. PW Dept may wait till ground softens up to finish.
- -The PW Dept is ready to do the old well tie-in.
- -Meter pit for all schools non pot use.
- -Knievel Farm: septic and leech field have been replaced. Lift station and piping are all new also.
- -Johnson Street lift station grinder installed about a month ago and is working.
- -Collecting information about money spent in 2024 to make sure ARPA money received back from projects at sewer plant and lift station then we will see revenue coming back.
- -Miller and Associates received 3 years of water usage reports/options for evaporative or deep injection wells or reducing percentage of RO discharge.
- -Vehicles have been updated, improvements to sell them at auction.
- -Reminder per town ordinance PW will clear snow if four inches or more; otherwise sanding in specific areas only.
- -PO commitment in 2025 to use all ARPA funds.
- -Park sidewalks: School uses their heated cab tractor to clear those walks when they clear school property. In exchange, PW will clear school parking lots and sand if requested.

BOT:

Mayor:

- -Emergency water line tie in status? Vault installation still needs to be done; three bids in process. Line and valve to quality water already on QW easement, used to be fire hydrant. Town of Wiggins needs to decide where to install vault. Trustee Miller questioned whether wet tap possible? Beau: that is the plan on our ten inch side.
- -Status of Harrison and Town progress on vault? Beau stated we have to wait on Quality Water. Earliest we could do vault would be March. If Harrison needs to move faster he can do a separate tie-in.
- -Vault will be cheapest option and will probably cast in place.
- -Wiggins Pest Control: Wiggins residents pay taxes for Wiggins Pest Control but Town of Wiggins is not receiving the funds collected. Wiggins Pest Control is their own board. Trusee Klecka will find out how to reach that board.
- -Christmas light contest what is the status of winners? Town Manager stated an email went to winners, advised to pick up checks. Did not think the other contestants were notified.

APPROVAL OF BILLS JANUARY 2025

Motion to approve bills was made by Mayor Pro-Tem Perrott and seconded by Trustee Miller to. Roll Call: Unanimous approval.

FINANCIALS ACTUAL TO BUDGET

-Trustee Miller: bills overlapping from last year? Town Manager explained there is a 13th pay period for those and confirmed there will be overlapping bills next year also.

Motion by Mayor Pro-Tem Perrott to approve. Motion was seconded by Trustee McKeighan. Roll Call: Unanimously approved.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

The Public Comments portion of the meeting was opened at 7:28 P.M.

- -Milton Beydler stated he will wait till variance information to present if needed.
- -Ashley Sidell with Tiger Parent Organization presented information about a car show at end of May. TPO is requesting TOW to approve closure of Main Street between Third and Fifth Avenues for a few hours only. They would like no parking signs posted the day prior. Parking will be in the school lots to keep cars away from residences. Mayor suggested seeking sponsorship of waste containers and porta pottys.
- -Board Vote: Motion by Trustee Klecka to approve blocking off Main Street between Third and Fifth Avenue from 8-3 P.M. Motion was seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Perrott. Roll Call: Unanimously approved.
- -The Public Comments portion of the meeting was closed at 7:41 P.M.

PUBLIC HEARING - BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

- -The Planning & Zoning Administrator presented staff summary report on variance requested at 318 Karen Street for minimum setback reduction. Applicant Beydler stated there are no curbs or gutters on Karen Street but had nothing else to add.
- -No public comments.
- -Board deliberation: Trustee McKeighan wanted to verify the structure will be fastened to concrete.
- -Motion to approve BOA Resolution 01-2025 by Mayor Pro-Tem Perrott. Motion was seconded by Trustee Seiber. Roll Call: Unanimously approved.

TOWN OF WIGGINS BOARD OF TRUSTEES SPECIAL MEETING

February 18, 2025 at 7:00 P.M.

CALL TO ORDER & ROLL CALL

A meeting of the Town Board of Trustees for the Town of Wiggins, Colorado was held on Tuesday, February 18, 2025. Mayor Chris Franzen called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. The following answered roll call: Mayor Pro-Tem Steven Perrott, and Trustees: Bruce Miller, Berry Tomlinson, Michael Seiber, and Robert McKeighan. Trustee Steven Klecka was absent. Staff present were Craig Miller, Town Manager; Nichole Seiber, Town Clerk/Treasurer, Diana Evans, Planning & Zoning Administrator; Beau Warden, Public Works Supervisor and Melinda Culley, Town Attorney.

DISCUSSION ON THE NORTH RIDGE SUBDIVISION

The Town Manager stated at the Wednesday, March 14th, 2024 Board of Trustees Meeting, there was discussion on the North Ridge Subdivision. The discussion included 1 1/4" lines that would be serviced by 5/8" lines with individual 24 individual meters. Since that meeting, Mr. Harrison has approached Town Staff several times with his belief there would be a 1" line and would have 1 tap per building (6 taps total). There was also a request made of Mr. Harrison to provide usage records for similar buildings in Fort Morgan. No records have been provided to date. Town Staff wishes to proceed with the Board's direction based on discussions that night.

Trustee Miller reiterated what was stated in the meeting that night. The recording of that night has been reviewed by Town Staff.

The Mayor stated the Board made it very clear that night what the Board's position was. He also stated the buildings that are currently situated in the subdivision have 1" lines. A water line is already installed and tied the tap off. The line is also buried. The Mayor reiterated, as was stated at the March 14th meeting, the Board is treating the units as single family units for tap purposes. Mr. Harrison was also supposed to buy an additional tap for landscaping.

There was discussion on comparing the lines to the farm property and Parkview commons. Piping has been prefabricated on the buildings Mr. Harrison has.

The Planning and Zoning Administrator spoke about the Town having a final plat that was signed February 28, 2024 and that had also been filed with the Clerk's Office. Also, the subdivision agreement states that all infrastructure would be completed before building permits are to be issued.

Trustee Miller asked the Town Attorney what our legal options are. The Town Attorney stated that without a signed site plan there is not much of an argument.

There was discussion on waterflow through different pipe sizes.

The Town Attorney reiterated that he can not get a building permit until the tap fees are paid.

Motion requiring Harrison Homes to have 25 water taps and 24 sewer taps for the North Ridge subdivision as discussed by the previous Board was made by Mayor Pro-Tem Perrott and seconded by Trustee Miller to. Roll Call: Unanimous approval.

BACKGROUND:

The subject matter of the Model Traffic Code relates primarily to comprehensive traffic control regulations for the town of Wiggins and is what the Town of Wiggins Police Department uses as a guide for issuing municipal citations and summons as it relates to traffic offenses.

The Model Traffic Code for Colorado was originally adopted by Colorado in 1952 and has been subsequently revised in 1962, 1966, 1970, 1973, 1974, 1977, 1995, 2003, 2009, 2010, 2018 and 2020.

When the town of Wiggins Board of trustees adopted the 1995 version of the Model Traffic Code for Colorado in 2019, the Model Traffic Code for Colorado had undergone four revisions that occurred in 2003, 2009, 2010 and 2018, with the most recent revision occurring in 2020.

SUMMARY:

On November 19, 2019, the Town of Wiggins Board of Trustees adopted the 1995 version of the Model Traffic Code for Colorado. Revisions to the Model Traffic Code of Colorado reflect updates and changes that have been made to title 42 of the Colorado revised Statute. Some of the updates and changes can range anywhere from additions to deletions of certain statutes as well as changes in the wording and sentencing requirements.

At the Feebruary 12, 2025 Work Session, staff presented a summary of some of the key differences between the 2020 and 2024 versions.

ADOPTING BY REFERENCE THE 2024 EDITION OF THE "MODEL TRAFFIC CODE FOR COLORADO" FOR THE REGULATION OF TRAFFIC IN THE TOWN OF WIGGINS, COLORADO

WHEREAS, pursuant to C.R.S. § 42-4-110(1)(b), municipalities may, in the manner prescribed by Article 16 of Title 31, C.R.S., adopt by reference all or any part of a model municipal traffic code that embodies the rules of the road and vehicle requirements as set out in the state traffic laws; and

WHEREAS, the Colorado Department of Transportation has prepared and adopted a 2024 revised edition of the Model Traffic Code for Colorado; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees desires to adopt by reference the 2024 Model Traffic Code for Colorado and has provided notice of the adoption of such Code by reference in the manner required by C.R.S. § 31-16-203;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF WIGGINS, COLORADO:

Section 1. Section 70.01 of the Wiggins Municipal Code is hereby repealed and reenacted to read as follows:

§ 70.01 Adoption.

- (A) Pursuant to Parts 1 and 2 of Article 16 of Title 31, C.R.S., there is hereby adopted by reference the 2024 edition of the *Model Traffic Code for Colorado* promulgated and published by the Colorado Department of Transportation, Traffic Safety and Engineering Services, 2829 W Howard Place, Denver, CO 80204.
- (B) The subject matter of the Model Traffic Code relates primarily to comprehensive traffic control regulations for the town. The purpose of this chapter and the Model Traffic Code adopted herein is to provide a system of traffic regulations consistent with state law and generally conforming to similar regulations throughout the state and the nation. Copies of the Model Traffic Code adopted herein are on file in the office of the Town Clerk, and may be inspected during regular business hours.
- **Section 2.** Section 70.02 of the Wiggins Municipal Code is hereby repealed and reenacted to read as follows:

§ 70.02 Amendments and Deletions.

The *Model Traffic Code*, 2024 Edition, is hereby amended as follows: **Section 1701** is deleted.

Section 3. The penalties for violations of the adopted Model Traffic Code, which are set forth in Sections 70.06 and 70.07 of the Wiggins Municipal Code, are hereby ratified and confirmed, and shall remain applicable to violations of the adopted 2024 edition of the Model Traffic Code.

<u>Section 4.</u> If any article, section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance is held to be unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The Board of Trustees hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and each part or parts hereof irrespective of the fact that any one part or parts be declared unconstitutional or invalid.

<u>Section 5.</u> The repeal or modification of any ordinance or part thereof by this ordinance shall not release, extinguish, alter, modify, or change in whole or in part any penalty, forfeiture, or liability, either civil or criminal, which shall have been incurred under such provision, and each provision shall be treated and held as still remaining in force for the purpose of sustaining any and all proper actions, suits, proceedings, and prosecutions for the enforcement of the penalty, forfeiture, or liability, as well as for the purpose of sustaining any judgment, decree, or order which can or may be rendered, entered, or made in such actions, suits, proceedings, or prosecutions.

The Wiggins Colorado Police Department serves the citizens of the Town of Wiggins and in order to do that successfully they need to have the latest and most update information available to them.

- The Board of Trustees may approve the resolution staff has provided for their consideration.
- The Board of Trustees may disapprove the resolution and direct the Town Attorney to prepare a resolution of disapproval for consideration at the Board's next meeting.

MUNICIPAL COURT, TOWN OF WIGGINS, STATE OF COLORADO

ORDER ESTABLISHING SCHEDULE OF FINES

This Schedule of Fines is authorized and published by this Court Order pursuant to Colorado Municipal Court Rules of Procedure ("CRMCP") Rule 210, the Model Traffic Code for Colorado ("MTC") as adopted by the Town of Wiggins, and the ordinances of the Town of Wiggins ("Wiggins Town Code" or "WTC"). The Court is authorized to and hereby establishes and continues the procedures for the payment to the Court Clerk according to a fine schedule in lieu of appearance in Court. This Order shall be published and prominently posted where fines are to be paid.

Unless prohibited by this Order, the Wiggins Police Department officers, and any other similarly designated Town personnel pursuant to WTC, are authorized to issue penalty assessment notices for violations of Wiggins Town Code and the Court Clerk, or other such designated person designated by the Court, is authorized to accept payment for such notices according to this schedule of fines in lieu of a court appearance. Except when mandatory court appearance is required, any person charged with a violation may pay the designated fine and surcharge(s) for the violation prior to the date and time set for the first appearance.

The Wiggins Municipal Court is a court of record pursuant to Wiggins Town Code §32.01. Pursuant to Colorado Revised Statute ("C.R.S") §13-10-113(1), any person convicted of violating a Municipal Ordinance may be incarcerated for a period not to exceed three hundred sixty-four (364) days or fined an amount not to exceed two thousand six hundred fifty dollars (\$2,650), or both. The maximum fine shall be adjusted for inflation per C.R.S. §13-10-113(1)(b).

Mandatory Summons

The following violations may not be paid early, and court appearance is required.

- 1) Violations resulting in an accident causing serious bodily injury, death or appreciable/substantial property damage;
- 2) Violations not listed on this Fine Schedule;
- 3) Violations allegedly committed by a Defendant under 18 years of age;
- 4) Reckless Driving (MTC §1401);
- 5) Exhibition of Speed or Speed Contest (MTC §1105);
- 6) Failure to Stop for a School Bus (MTC §1903);
- 7) Eluding or attempting to elude a police officer (MTC §1413);
- 8) Speeding twenty-five (25) miles or more over the posted speed limit (MTC §1101);
- 9) Speeding forty (40) miles or more over the posted speed limit (MTC §1101); and
- 10) Violations of MTC §§ 501-509, unless otherwise specified below in this Fine Schedule.

If the combined total of original points is greater than six (6) points the Summons shall require an appearance before the Court.
- 2) Summons and Complaints alleging more than one general ordinance violation shall require an appearance before the Court.
- 3) Any person who resolves their case through a plea bargain with the Town Attorney or Town Prosecutor, either by mail or in person, shall pay the fine schedule amount for the original violation(s).
- 4) Any person who enters a plea of guilty as part of a plea-bargained disposition and who does not wish to pay the scheduled fine must appear as directed on the Summons and Complaint.
- 5) Stays of execution may be granted by the office of the Municipal Court through a process agreed to by the Presiding Municipal Court Judge and Municipal Court.
- 6) The payment of the scheduled fine shall constitute a final judgment and conviction of the offense(s) charged.
- 7) Any person charged with violations other than those listed in this Fine Schedule shall appear in Municipal Court.
- 8) At the time of sentencing, and based on the Judge's discretion, fines may be increased or decreased depending on mitigating or aggravating circumstances.

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING A MUNICIPAL COURT FINE AND FEE SCHEDULE FOR ORDINANCE VIOLATIONS AND AMENDING SECTION 32.07 OF THE WIGGINS MUNICIPAL CODE TO REDUCE THE SURCHARGE ON MUNICIPAL ORDINANCE VIOLATIONS

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees is authorized pursuant to State law, including but not limited to C.R.S. § 13-10-113, to establish fines applicable to municipal ordinance violations; and

WHEREAS, Town staff, in consultation with the Municipal Court Judge, has proposed an updated Schedule of Fines for municipal ordinance violations; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has reviewed the proposed Schedule of Fines and finds that it should be approved; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees previously approved a \$65 surcharge to be assessed on every summons or complaint issued or case charged in to the Town Municipal Court or deferred sentence and judgment, including penalty assessments, but excluding parking violations; and

WHEREAS, Town staff has recommended this surcharge be reduced to \$50; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees desires to amend Section 32.07 of the Municipal Code to reflect the reduced surcharge.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF WIGGINS, COLORADO:

- **Section 1.** The Wiggins Municipal Court Fine Schedule is hereby approved in essentially the same form as the copy of such schedule attached to this Ordinance.
- **Section 2.** Section 32.07 of the Wiggins Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows (words to be deleted are stricken through; words to be added are underlined):

§ 32.07 SURCHARGE ON MUNICIPAL ORDINANCE VIOLATIONS.

- (A) A surcharge in the amount of \$65 \$50.00 shall be assessed in every summons/complaint issued or case charged into the Town Municipal Court that results in a conviction (whether by plea or at trial) or deferred sentence and judgment, including penalty assessments, but excluding parking violations.
- (B) The surcharge levied pursuant to this section is separate and distinct from any and all other costs, fines and fees assessed or levied by the Municipal Court.

- (C) All surcharges collected or received by the Municipal Court pursuant to this section shall be deposited in the General Fund account/a separate account to be used for the purposes set forth herein.
- (D) The primary use of the surcharge shall be to fund costs of the Town Police Department, including, but not limited to, costs incurred in connection with training and equipment needs of the Police Department.
- (E) The surcharge imposed by this section may not be suspended or waived by the court unless the court determines the defendant is indigent.

PASTURELAND LEASE AGREEMENT WITH HUNTING PRIVILEGES (Knievel Property)

THIS PASTURELAND FARM LEASE AGREEMENT ("Lease") is made and entered into this day of, 2025, by and between TOWN OF WIGGINS, COLORADO, a Colorado municipal corporation ("Landlord"), and MICHAEL K. MILLER AND CAREY R. MILLER (collectively, the "Tenant").
NOW, THEREFORE, Landlord and Tenant agree as follows:

2. <u>Term; Rent.</u> The term of this Lease shall commence on the date first written above and ending on December 31, 2030, unless sooner terminated by the mutual written consent of the Landlord and Tenant or as provided in as provided in this Lease. As consideration for this Lease, the Tenant shall pay the Landlord rent in the amount of \$3,510.00 (\$13 acre x 270 acres), which such amount shall be due on or before January 31 of each year of this Lease.

- Condition of Leased Property; Risk of Loss. Prior to signing this Lease, the Tenant inspected the Leased Property and leases it in an "as is" condition. No additional representation, statement, or warranty, express or implied, has been made by or on behalf of the Landlord as to the condition of the Leased Property. In no event shall the Landlord be liable for any defect in the Leased Property or for any limitation on its use for farmland. Tenant assumes the risk of loss or damage to any crops or Tenant property, whether from windstorm, fire, earthquake, snow, flood, water run-off, soil conditions, or any other causes whatsoever. Tenant expressly recognizes that Landlord and other entities intend to store, recharge, and use water adjacent to the Leased Property and hereby agrees it will not hold the Town or such other entities liable for any damages caused to the Tenant's crops or other property by the storage, recharge and use of water adjacent to the Leased Property, including, but not limited to, any damage caused by a rise in the water table, flooding, or other damages or inconveniences which are a reasonably foreseeable consequence of Landlord's and the other entities' intended uses of the property adjacent to the Leased Property.
- 4. <u>Permitted and Required Uses.</u> Tenant may occupy and use the Leased Property for the following uses and practices:
 - a. Agricultural uses, including the open growing of crops and keeping of livestock, the types of which shall be approved by the Landlord in advance, but which approval by the Landlord shall not be unreasonably withheld, delayed or conditioned, and at levels consistent with applicable zoning ordinances and regulations for the Leased Property, and with any soil and conservation plans applicable to the Leased Property. This Lease is a pastureland lease. Tenants shall not be entitled to use any water on the Leased Property for irrigation during the term of the Lease.
 - b. Use of agrichemicals, including but not limited to, fertilizers and biocides, but only in those amounts and with that frequency of application necessary to accomplish Tenant's permitted agricultural uses.

- c. Control by legally authorized techniques of predatory animals and problem species which have caused or are likely to cause damage to crops or other property of Tenant.
- d. Tenant shall be permitted, in Tenant's reasonable discretion to harvest the crops on the Leased Property and to use the buildings, corrals, storage bins and units, and business equipment necessary to complete the harvest and sale of the crops that are on the Leased Property as of the date of this Lease and that may be grown any time after the date of this Lease.
- e. For hunting purposes during the season established and in accordance with the laws, rules, and regulations of the State of Colorado and County of Morgan.
- f. There shall be no principal use of the Leased Property other than for the uses described herein.

5. <u>Limitation on Hunting Privileges</u>.

- a. Tenant and their guests shall have and possess valid Colorado hunting licenses that cover the species the Tenant intends to hunt on the Lease Property.
- b. Tenants and their shall comply with all Colorado, federal, and local hunting laws and regulations. Should the Tenant or any guest violate applicable laws and regulations, the Landlord may immediately terminate this Lease.
- c. While on the Leased Property, Tenant and their guests shall: (1) maintain safe gun handling practices; (2) never shoot in the direction of any people, buildings, or livestock; (3) leave all gates as Tenant finds them; (4) use proper care in crossing fences; (5) operate vehicles only on established roadways or lanes; (6) not use alcohol or unlawful drugs; and (7) build no fires.
- d. Tenant agrees that the Leased Property shall be kept free of litter at all times and that litter or trash will be removed by Tenant.
- e. Tenant may allow guests to use the Leased Property when accompanied by Tenant, but Tenant is prohibited from charging a fee or requiring remuneration in exchange for granting permission to anyone to hunt on the Leased Premises. Further, no commercial hunting, fishing, or guide activities may occur on the property by the tenant or his guests.
- f. Tenant recognizes the inherent dangers associated with hunting, both natural and human-created. Tenant recognizes that accidents involving firearms, ammunition, falling trees, hidden ground openings, poisonous plants and animals, and various other dangers may forcibly occur on the Leased Property. Tenant acknowledges his recognition of these dangers and the possible existence of dangerous physical conditions on the premises such as, but not limited to, those described on the enclosed map. With the aforementioned recognitions in mind, the Tenant agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Landlord, its officials, officers, employees, and agents from all claims, suits, losses, personal injuries, deaths, property liability, and all other liability resulting directly or indirectly from or on account of hunting activities engaged in by Tenant or Tenant's guests on the Leased Property, said obligation to indemnify extending to the reimbursement of Landlord for all expenses and suits including but not limited to, judgments, attorney fees, and court costs

- Maintenance. Landlord shall have no obligation to repair, replace, improve, or maintain any portion of the Leased Property. Tenant shall at all times during the term of this Lease and at Tenant's sole expense maintain the Leased Property in a reasonably good and safe condition. Tenants shall use reasonable care to prevent waste, damage, or injury to the Leased Property, and shall conduct agricultural operations in accordance with prevailing standards of husbandry. Tenant, and Tenant's agents and employees, may not cut or damage trees, roads, water facilities, ponds or dwellings, fences, buildings, or other property on the Leased Property without the prior written consent of Landlord, which consent shall not be unreasonably conditioned, delayed or withheld by Landlord. Tenant, and Tenant's agents and employees, agree to repair any material damage Tenant, or Tenant's agents and employees, may cause on the Leased Property and to return the Leased Property to Landlord in the condition a reasonable person would expect the Leased Property to be in after the completion by Tenant, and Tenant's agents and employees, of the Permitted and Required Uses in Section 4 of this Lease excepting ordinary wear and tear and damage by acts of God. Tenant, and Tenant's agents and employees, shall comply with all applicable ordinances, resolutions, rules, and regulations in its use and occupancy of the Leased Property. If Tenant fails to comply with its obligations under this Section, Landlord may at its option terminate this Lease as provided herein or take such measures as it determines necessary to bring the Leased Property into compliance with the terms of this Lease, and the cost of such measures shall be paid by Tenant. Upon termination of this Lease, the Tenant shall return the Leased Property to the Landlord in the condition a reasonable person would expect the Leased Property to be in after the completion by the Tenant, and Tenant's agents and employees, of the Permitted and Required Uses in Section 4 of this Lease excepting ordinary wear and tear and damage by acts of God.
- 7. <u>Utilities, Supplies & Equipment.</u> During the term of the Lease, the Tenant shall be solely responsible for payment of all utility services for the Leased Property (if any). Tenant shall promptly pay all utility charges as they become due. Tenant shall be solely responsible for the costs of all labor, machinery, fertilizer, chemicals, seed, and other items needed for farming, and shall promptly pay for all labor and materials furnished at the instance of Tenant.
- 8. <u>Alterations and Improvements</u>. Tenants shall not place, build, expand, alter, or add to any structures or other improvements on the Leased Property without the Landlord's prior written consent, which consent may not be unreasonably conditioned, delayed, or withheld by the Landlord.
- 9. <u>Non-liability of Landlord.</u> The landlord shall have no responsibility, liability, or obligation with respect to the safety or security of any personal property placed or located on, at, or in the Leased Property, it is acknowledged and understood by the Tenant that the safety and security of any such property is the sole responsibility and risk of Tenant.
- 10. <u>Right of Entry; Reserved Uses.</u> Upon prior notice to Tenant, Landlord shall at all times have the right to enter the Leased Property to inspect, improve, maintain, alter, or utilize the Leased Property at reasonable times and in any reasonable manner authorized to Landlord and which does not unreasonably interfere with Tenant's use and enjoyment of the Leased Property. In the exercise of its rights pursuant to this Lease, the Tenant, and the Tenant's agents and employees, shall use reasonable efforts to avoid any material damage or material interference with any Landlord installations, structures, utilities, or improvements on, under, or adjacent to the Leased Property.
- 11. <u>Tenant Liability.</u> Tenant shall be solely responsible for any reasonable and documented material damages suffered by the Landlord as a result of Tenant's use and occupancy of the Leased Property. Tenant agrees to indemnify and hold Landlord, its officers, agents, and employees harmless from and against all reasonable and documented liability, claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including but not limited to reasonable attorneys' fees, arising out of, resulting from, or in any way

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connected with (a) Tenant's use and occupancy of the Leased Property; (b) any mechanics liens claimed or recorded against the Leased Property as a result of Tenant's use or occupancy thereof; or (c) the rights and obligations of Tenant under this Lease. Tenant agrees to hold harmless and make no claim against Landlord, its officers, agents, and employees for any damages which may be caused by the acts of Landlord, its officers, agents, and employees, to Tenant's crops, property, or improvements located upon the Leased Property; however, this shall not apply with respect to the grossly negligent, wanton and willful acts of Landlord, and Landlord's agents and employees.

- 12. <u>Insurance</u>. Tenants shall purchase and maintain for the full term of this Lease farm liability and general liability insurance, with minimum coverage of not less than \$350,000 for any injury to one person in any single occurrence, and \$1,000,000 for any injury to two or more persons in any single occurrence. The general liability insurance policy shall include coverage for bodily injury, property damage, and personal injury. Tenants shall also maintain workers compensation and employers liability insurance if and as required by the provisions of the Workers Compensation Act, as amended, of the State of Colorado. Before the commencement of activities under this Lease, the Tenant must present evidence of the required coverages to the Landlord. The required coverages shall be maintained for the term of this Lease, and the Tenant shall notify the Landlord of any material reduction or exhaustion of aggregate policy limits. If Tenant fails to purchase or maintain the insurance coverage stated required herein, the Landlord shall have the right to procure such insurance coverage at Tenant's expense.
- 13. <u>Non-Waiver of CGIA.</u> The parties understand and agree that the Landlord is relying on and does not waive or intend to waive by any provision of this Lease the monetary limitations or any other rights, immunities, and protections provided by the Colorado Governmental Immunity Act, C.R.S. § 24-10-101 <u>et seq.</u> ("CGIA") as from time to time amended, or otherwise available to the Landlord, its officers, or its employees.
- 14. Breach; Remedies; Termination. At Landlord's option, it shall be deemed a breach of this Lease if Tenant defaults in the performance of any term of this Lease. In the event the Landlord elects to declare a breach, the Landlord shall give the Tenant twenty (20) days written notice requiring compliance with the specified terms and conditions of this Lease, or delivery of the possession of the Leased Property. In the event, that any default remains uncorrected after twenty-one (21) days written notice, the Landlord, at the Landlord's option, may declare the Lease term ended, repossess the Leased Property, and expel the Tenant without being deemed guilty of a trespass or of a forcible entry and detainer and without prejudice to any other remedies to which Landlord may be entitled. In addition to the foregoing, the Landlord may immediately terminate this Lease if the Landlord determines in its reasonable discretion that the Tenant's use of the Leased Property poses a material human health, safety, or welfare hazard or violates applicable laws, regulations, ordinances or water court decree, which such hazard or violation cannot be remedied. Further, the Landlord may terminate this Lease upon sixty (60) days' written notice to Tenant in the event the Landlord determines to develop or use all or a portion of the Leased Property in a manner Landlord determines will be incompatible with the continuation of this Lease, or if Landlord determines that all or a portion of the Leased Property is needed for the exclusive use of Landlord.
- 15. <u>Notice.</u> Any notices or communication required or permitted hereunder shall be given in writing and shall be personally delivered, or sent by United States mail, postage prepaid, registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, addressed to the recipient party and its address set forth in the first paragraph of this Lease. Notices shall be effective upon mailing.
- 16. <u>Non-Waiver.</u> A waiver by the Landlord of any breach of any term of this Lease shall not be deemed a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or any other term or provision thereof.

- 17. <u>No Sublease.</u> The Lease granted herein is personal to the parties hereto, and the Tenant may not sublease or assign any of its interest in the Lease without the Landlord's prior written consent. The foregoing shall not preclude a lender's interest in crops.
- 18. <u>Status of Tenant.</u> The tenant acting under this Lease is not an employee, agent, or joint venture of the Landlord. Tenant's operations will not be supervised by any employee or official of the Landlord, nor will Tenant exercise supervision over any employee or official of the Landlord. Tenant shall not represent that Tenant is an employee, agent, or joint venture of the Landlord. Tenant shall supply all personnel, equipment, and materials at Tenant's sole expense. **Tenant is not entitled to Workers' Compensation benefits from the Landlord, and is obligated to pay federal and state income tax on money earned pursuant to this Lease.**

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING A LEASE AGREEMENT FOR A PORTION OF THE KNIEVEL PROPERTY

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has the power pursuant to Section 31-15-713(1)(c), C.R.S. to lease real estate owned by the municipality when deemed by the Board of Trustees to be in the best interest of the Town; and

WHEREAS, any lease for a period of over one year must be approved by ordinance of the Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, the Town is the owner of that certain real property known as the Knievel Property in the W $\frac{1}{2}$ of Section 22 and the W $\frac{1}{2}$ of Section 15, Township 4N, Range 60W of the 6th Principal Meridian (the "Property"); and

WHEREAS, Michael and Carey Miller desire to lease a portion of the Property for the purpose of pasture farming; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has determined it is in the best interest of the Town and its citizens to enter into the Lease Agreement contemplated herein.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF WIGGINS, COLORADO:

<u>Section 1</u>. The proposed Pasture Farm Lease Agreement ("Agreement"), between the Town and Michael K. Miller and Carey R. Miller for the lease of a portion of the Town-owned property located in the W ½, Section 22, Township 4N, Range 60W of the 6th Principal Meridian, is hereby approved in essentially the same form as the copy of such Lease accompanying this Ordinance.

<u>Section 2</u>. The Mayor is hereby authorized to execute the Lease, except that the Mayor is hereby further granted the authority to negotiate and approve prior to execution thereof such revisions to said Lease as are determined necessary or desirable for the protection of the Town, so long as the term of the lease is not extended, and the other essential terms and conditions of the Lease are not altered.

<u>Section 3.</u> If any article, section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance is held to be unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The Board of Trustees hereby declares it would have passed this ordinance and each part or parts hereof irrespective of the fact that any one part or parts be declared unconstitutional or invalid.

<u>Section 4.</u> All other ordinances or portion this ordinance or any portion hereof are hereby repeated.	9
